Resolution #: RSA 18-10-09 Inuktut Language Legislation

WHEREAS in December 2016, the Prime Minister committed to an Indigenous Languages Act (ILA) co-developed with Indigenous Peoples, aimed at preserving, protecting and revitalizing Indigenous languages;

AND WHEREAS that commitment was a most welcome one:

AND WHEREAS in June 2017, the Government of Canada, Inuit Tapiriit Kanatami (ITK), the Assembly of First Nations, and the Métis established a Co-Development Working Group to work on the ILA, and NTI has taken part in that work;

AND WHEREAS NTI has advocated for federal legislation in relation to Inuktut that would go well beyond symbolic recognition, and would include legislative provisions that would give Inuktut a certain level of official or elevated status in Inuit Nunangat, would make Inuktut a language in federal offices in Inuit Nunangat and in the delivery of federal programs and services, and would provide federal funding support for Inuktut equitable to federal spending on French and English minority language groups in Inuit Nunangat;

AND WHEREAS given that there is only one year left in the forecasted life of the current Parliament, the co-development of federal languages legislation in relation to Inuktut and other indigenous languages must result in draft legislation, suitable for tabling in Parliament, being completed in the near future;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. NTI continue to be engaged, fully and actively and making best use of its expertise and resources at both the political and working levels, in the codevelopment of federal Inuktut language legislation;
- 2. NTI continue to promote Inuktut language legislation that goes well beyond mere symbolic recognition of Inuktut, but, instead, defines a status and set of rights and commitments in relation to Inuktut that will contribute, in meaningful and measurable ways, to Inuktut being the primary language of work, education, and delivery of public sector programs and services, in Nunavut and in other parts of Inuit Nunangat.
